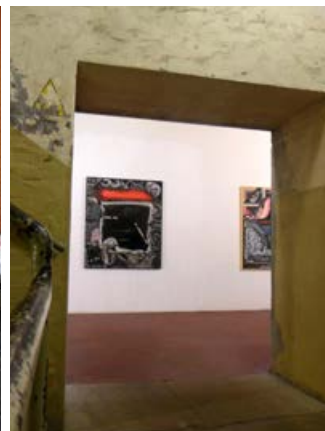

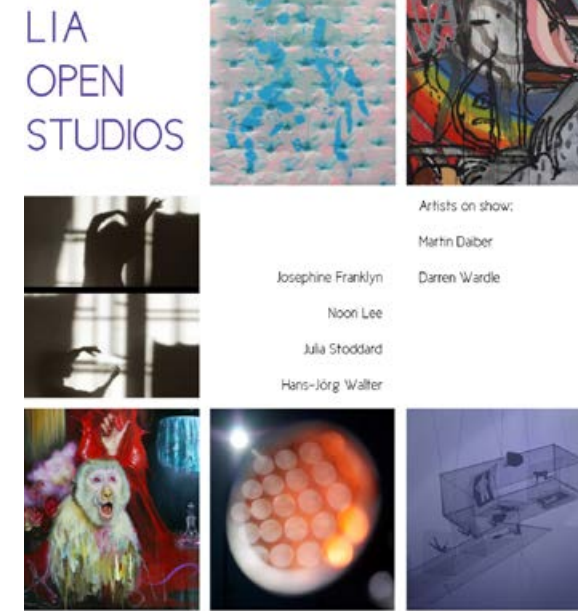

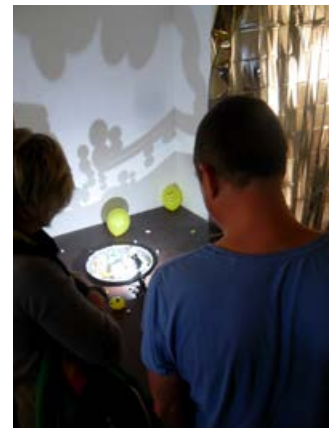

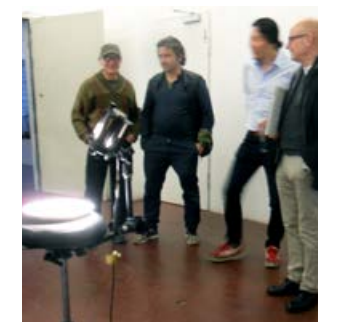

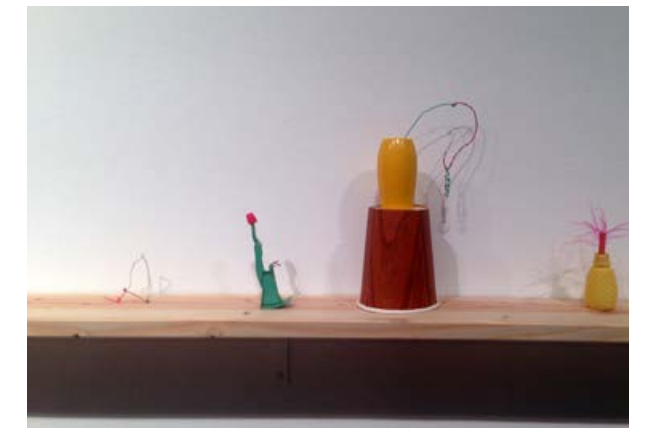
Josephine Hellen Franklyn

Term: March – May 2017



Josephine Hellen Franklyn received the first award by the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology School of Art to pass a three months residency at LIA Leipzig International Art Programme 2017 in conjunction with a solo exhibition at the Australian Embassy in Berlin.

We cordially thank the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology School of Art (RMIT) as well as the Australian Embassy Berlin, especially artist and RMIT senior lecturer Peter Westwood for his engagement, Professor Julian Goddard as Head of School and the Australia Embassy team for their generous support.

Her installations generate minimal narratives between sculptural found objects and the botanical, as well as objects from daily life such as magazine cut outs and in situ recordings. She is triggered with the question how we measure and understand things that have left their comfort zone, their familiar background, origin or context. Josephine re-contextualizes her objects and sheds a new light on them, inviting the viewer to consider the relationships and narratives between the individual parts of her installations and to reflect on how these narratives relate to broader social conditions.

Julia Stoddard

Term: January – June 2017



First awardee of the School of Visual Arts New York (SVA) was Julia Stoddard who stayed from January to June 2017.

Julia worked on several projects during her time in Leipzig, exploring new environments around her: she made trips to former coal mines in the South of Leipzig to investigate processes of cultivation and re-naturation of industrial landscapes and to shoot film material.

Furthermore she dealt with the industrial atmosphere of her studio space, planting a little window garden and developing a room-sized plucked string instrument that was fixed on the walls. Julia created tunes through performing on the instrument, playing the strings with the effect that the walls resonated the vibrations.

Santiago Chavez

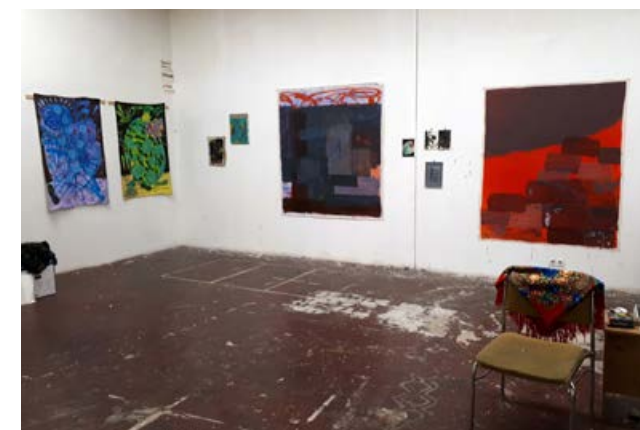
Term: July – December 2017



Santiago Chavez was second awardee of SVA and stayed from July to December 2017.

Santiago delved into an intense period of painting and drawing, focussing on the matter of nature as well as reflecting his personal thoughts and feelings during the experiences of new encounters and being abroad for the first time in Europe and Germany.

He developed a series of drawing studies of local plants and insects, like butterflies, as well as several bigger and smaller paintings, all playing with methods of expressionistic abstraction of inner and outer forms and subjects. Together with previous paper works and writings, Santiago wants to reassemble his works in an artistic book.

This year's awardees of the NYAA, Atalanta Arden-Miller, Aidan Baker-Hill, Naomi Nakazato and Arngrímur Sigurðsson spent June and July in Leipzig. Together with intern Aleksandra Janz we made tours through the city and visited several cultural and art spots, like the Academy of Fine Arts HGB, the GfzK art center as well as the monument Völkerschlachtdenkmal.

We made city trips to Halle and Berlin where we met former LIA artist Daniel Lannes for an artist talk.

The students had encounters with Ellen Akimoto, Aika Furukawa, Daniel Lannes and internationally known painter David Schnell. Painter and teacher Justus Jager was the guest critic to give feedback on the current works of the four.

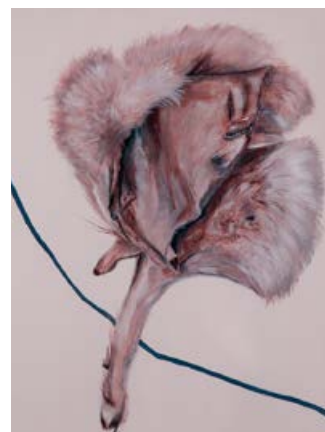

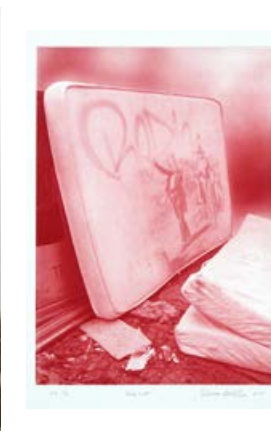

On occasions we bring together artists, curators, members of academies or art institutions and also politicians that work in the field of arts and culture.



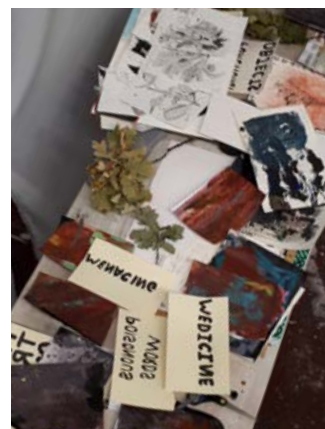

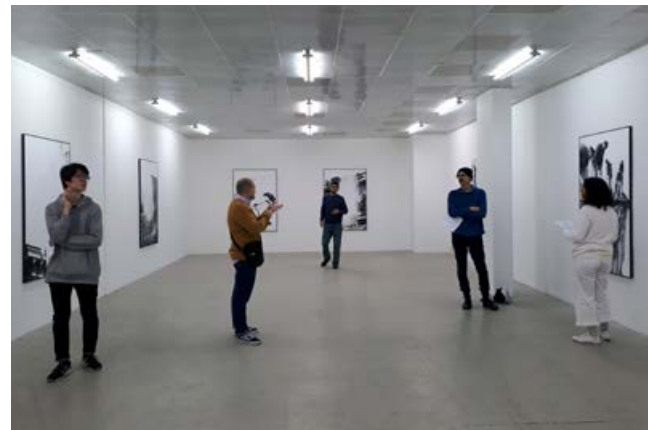

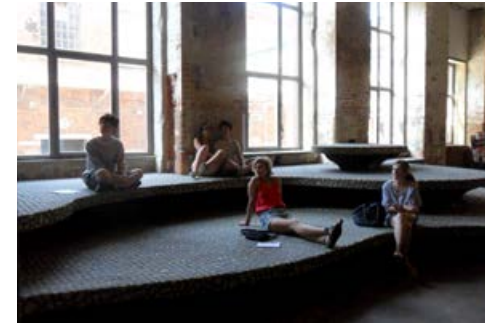

(eh) Freitagabend im Diessenhofer Museum Kunst + Wissen: Die Jahresausstellung des örtlichen Kunstvereins feierte Vernissage mit dem Basler Maler Ralph Bürgin. Diesmal barg der Freitag, der 13. durchaus Positives in sich, indem abends im Diessenhofer Museum Kunst + Wissen die Ausstellung «Pieces and Shadows» mit Werken des Basler Malers Ralph Bürgin eröffnet wurde. Kuratorin Helga Sandl begrüßte die rund 30 Gäste in der Eingangshalle des Museums; August Keller als Präsident des Kunstvereins erzählte von den glücklichen Umständen, die schliesslich zur aktuellen Diessenhofer Ausstellung führten: Der einstige Stipendiat im renommierten Künstlerzentrum von Anna Rohland in Leipzig kam dank Verknüpfungen im privaten Umfeld nach Diessenhofen. Nach August Keller wurde das

grossformatige Bild im Entrée zum Hintergrund für den Schöpfer selbst, flankiert von der Kunsthistorikerin Tildy Hanhart, die sich als Mitglied der Ausstellungskommission intensiv mit den nicht gerade alltäglichen Bildern des 37-jährigen Baslers befasst hat. Dieser äussert sich zu seinen Ölbildern und Pinselzeichnungen und zum Ausstellungsmotto wie folgt: «Der Titel der Ausstellung ist einfach und vielschichtig zugleich. 'Piece' steht für ein Ganzes, das Bild, sowie für ein Bruchstück. 'Shadows' oder Schatten können sich über die Stücke/Bruchstücke legen oder wie etwas Lebendiges ein schlummerndes Dasein führen.» Schon allein diese Definition des Künstlers lässt erahnen, dass er alles andere als leichte Kost präsentiert. Am einfachsten zu schildern sind noch die Formate: Sie reichen von A3 bis zu allemal vier Quadratmetern, erscheinen teils farblich intensiv, teils in fast schon transparenten Flächen zwischen akzentuierten Pinselstrichen, die allerdings stets nur andeuten.

Fragmente in Form von Händen, Füssen oder Kopf

Die weitaus meisten Arbeiten spielen mit der menschlichen Gestalt respektive ihren Fragmenten in Form von Händen, Füssen oder Kopf. Sind sie nun grad am Auseinanderdriften oder streben sie einander entgegen? Die Interpretation ist dem Betrachter überlassen. Wenn einzeln stehende Köpfe ein Bild dominieren, so tun sie dies mit fast schon archaischer Wucht. Nach dem Referat als hilfreichen Einstieg in die Auseinandersetzung mit den Bildern begab sich die Gästeschar mit dem Künstler auf eine Tour durch die Ausstellung und lauschte dessen Erläuterungen. Jenen, die noch mehr wissen wollen, sei das Künstlergespräch mit Anna Rohland empfohlen, das zur Vernissage am 21. Januar 2018 um 11.00 Uhr im Museum stattfinden wird. Öffnungszeiten: Samstags 15.00 bis 18.00, sonntags 14.00 bis 18.00 Uhr.

Interview of Friederike Schicht (Radio MDR Sachsen) with Santiago Chavez



Ascherleben - Annemarie Vink hat einen Plan. „Ich will im September möglichst vielen richtig gute Werke mit nach Hause nehmen“, sagt die Frau aus Amsterdam. Für mehr als zwei Monate steht ihre Stafflei nämlich nicht an den Grachten, sondern im Ascherleber Bestehpark.

Obwohl – eine richtige Stafflei findet sich in ihrem vorübergehenden Arbeitsort gar nicht. Dafür hat die Künstlerin schon mal mehrere große Papierbögen zu die Wand gehängt. Jedes gut zwei Meter hoch. Über einem Meter breit. Annemarie Vink liebt das große Format.

Die Malerin gehört zu den vier von einer Jury ausgewählten international renommierten Künstlern, die in diesem Jahr das Ascherleber Sommer-Atelier bestreiten.

Beworben habe sie sich, weil sie sich für deutsche, besonders aber auch die ostdeutsche Geschichte, Kultur und Kunst interessiert. Und weil sie im vergangenen Jahr schon einmal die Ausstellung in der Großkottlung Neo Rauch besucht habe und jetzt die Stadt nicht besser kennenlernen will. Und die Menschen, die hier leben.

Wenn Annemarie Vink's Plan aufgeht, dann geht der eine oder andere Ascherleber im September sogar mit auf die Reise nach Amsterdam – als Kunstwerk. In Öl auf Papier. Denn die 57-Jährige will die Ascherleber nicht nur kennenlernen, sondern auch porträtieren.

Dabei muss aber nicht zwangsläufig in jeder Arbeit der Mensch im Mittelpunkt stehen. Genau so liebt die Künstlerin die Beschäftigung mit der Natur und der Stofflichkeit von ganz profanen Dingen des Alltags.

Von Ascherleben und dem Ascherleberer will sich Annemarie Vink überraschen und möglichst zu neuen künstlerischen Schritten inspirieren lassen.

Gravierende Unterschiede der Arbeitsatmosphäre

Als Annemarie Vink vor einem Jahr Teilhaberin am Leipziger International Art Programm (LIA) war, hatte sie dort ihre Zeit in berühmten Kunstquartier „Alte Spinnerei“ aufgeschlagen.

Verglichen mit Leipzig sei Ascherleben schon etwas völlig anderes, sagt die Malerin und meint nicht nur den Unterschied zwischen einer Groß- und einer Kleinstadt, sondern auch die Unterschiedlichkeit der Arbeitsatmosphäre.

„Dort die morbide Charme einer alten Industrieanlage - hier die archaischere Modernität des Bestehparks. Das ist für mich schon spannend“, sagt die Niederländerin.

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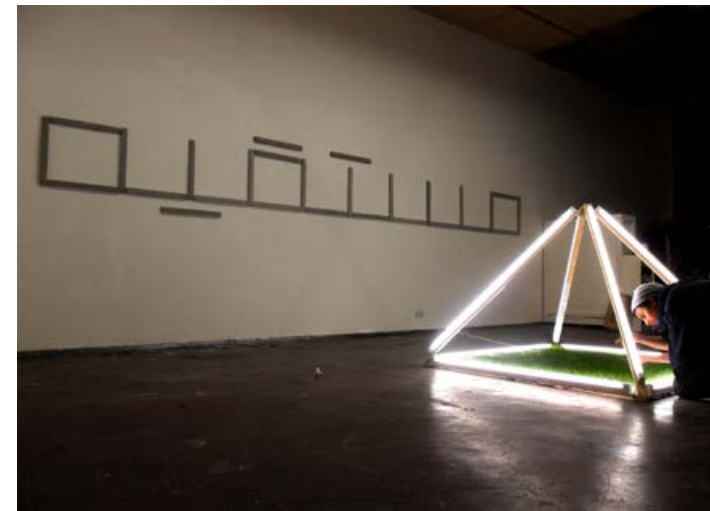
